The following activities took place, various EarthLincs members gave their support...

LocalMotion Flash Mob

On Saturday 10th June EarthLincs supported the #climatehopelincoln flashmob on the High Street. People of all ages performed a simple piece of street theatre, with a track of David Attenborough warning of the danger the planet is in. It was very well received by passers-by.

Climate Change exhibition

The XR/Climate Commission 'rainbow' educational exhibition spent two weeks in Lincoln Central library, and a day in the Waterside Centre.

Farmers' Market stall

On Saturday 17th June 10am–3pm, EarthLincs shared a stall in the Farmers' Market, Castle Square with the Lincolnshire Organic Gardeners and Extinction Rebellion, conducting a survey on public concerns about the environment.

St. Peter in Eastgate hosted a successful *Swish* – around 45 people brought clothes to exchange, and took 'new' items away with them. A sewing machine was available to do instant alterations!

We shared FairTrade wine and local cheeses. The purpose was to challenge the damage done by fast fashion, to save waste, carbon and money, and to make new friendships.

Liquorice Park Community Open Day

This was held on on Saturday 24th June 11am–4pm and was joyful celebration of this wonderful wildlife park in the heart of the City – music, singing, arts and crafts and even a surprise appearance of Extinction Rebellion's *Red Rebels*.

EarthLincs' stall invited children to take part in a wildlife quiz and tie 'wish hearts' around the park, as well as raising awareness of EarthLincs Drop-In and our future plans.

Doughnut Economics – a system for the future

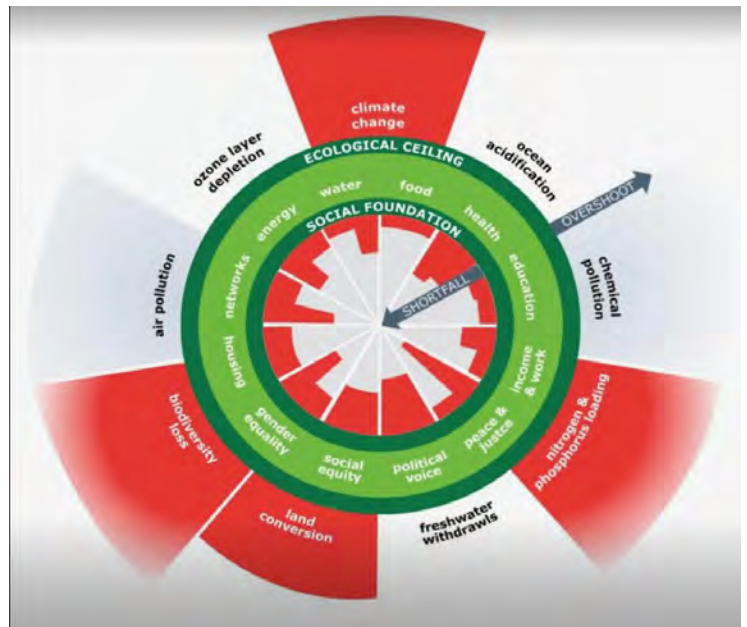
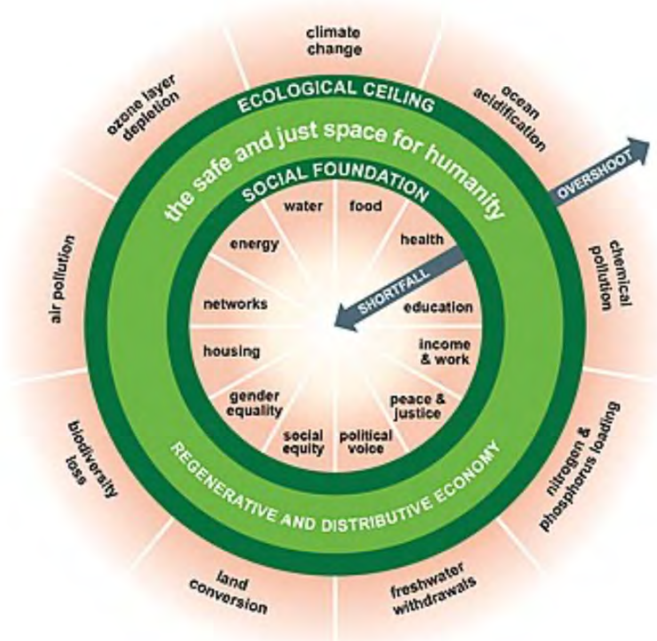
Three of our members attended the Climate Hope 'Doughnut Economics' workshop day as part of Great Big Green Week. The Event was a collaboration between LocalMotion, the University of Lincoln and other organisations.

'Humanity's 21st century challenge is to meet the needs of all within the means of the planet. In other words, to ensure that no one falls short on life's essentials (from food and housing to healthcare and political voice), while ensuring that collectively we do not overshoot our pressure on Earth's life-supporting systems, on which we fundamentally depend – such as a stable climate, fertile soils, and a protective ozone layer. The Doughnut of social and planetary boundaries is a playfully serious approach to framing that challenge, and it acts as a compass for human progress this century'

A facilitator from DEAL – Doughnut Economics Action Lab – whose remit is supporting communities in turning the ideas of Doughnut economics into action, took us through a number of practical sessions, sharing examples where the model is in place throughout the world.

Using questions such as 'What are the things we need to transform that no longer serve us'; 'what is wrong with our social systems' and recognising the urgency of climate breakdown that faces us, the day looked at how we can come together to respect the health of the planet. There were people from groups in Lincoln and beyond, including the Climate Commission, local councillors and many community groups including Green Synergy and Project Fast Fashion. It was a great opportunity for seeing the possibilities of existing and potential partnerships in Lincoln.

The 'Doughnut Economy' is another model for sustainable development provided by UK economist Kate Raworth in her book 'Doughnut Economics: Seven Ways to Think Like a 21st-Century Economist' (2017). Amsterdam will be the first city in the world to officially adopt this model of economics.

The Doughnut Economy model is a simple way to illustrate a complex goal. The inner ring of the doughnut represents minimum standards of living, based on the UN's Sustainable Development Goals. This entails the basic essentials everyone needs to thrive, from food and clean water to gender equality and adequate housing. According to the model, no-one should fall into the hole in the centre of the doughnut, which would mean they don't have enough to afford basic needs. The outer ring of the doughnut represents the ecological limits of the planet, from biodiversity loss and air pollution to climate breakdown.
