Message from Lincoln Womens' Institute.

Lincoln WI are planning an environmental marketplace on Thursday 2nd May between 7.30pm and 9pm at the Grandstand on Carholme Road. The aim is to showcase local environmental groups/charities and inspire members to get involved.

It's little-known that the WI has always been a campaigning group on environmental concerns, for example, as early as 1936 there was a campaign about the large scale pollution of rivers and streams in rural areas. The WI is a founding member of the

Climate Coalition and more recent campaigns are: 2009 – 'SOS for honey bees' and in 2017 'End Plastic Soup' about microplastic pollution. Last year's issue was 'Clean rivers for people and wildlife'.

They would love members to get involved with local conservation/environmental work and to encourage this are going to hold this event, where local groups/charities can explain to members what they do and how they can get involved. They are able to supply a table and chairs, cups of tea and (as you would expect) cake! This would be provided at no cost to exhibitors and a great opportunity to showcase what you do to WI members.

Living Plants v Fake Foliage

Have you noticed the proliferation of plastic flowers and foliage on shop frontages and outdoor eating areas in the City Centre? They may brighten up the 'shopping experience' but are no match for real, living plants and flowers.

Most fake plants are made from synthetic, non-biodegradable materials such as plastic and PVC. They contribute to plastic pollution, emit VOCs (volatile organic compounds) which are harmful to human health, ultimately ending up in landfill. On the other hand, living plants naturally raise our spirits, provide food and habitats for birds and insects and help reduce CO2 emissions. City centre trees also provide much-needed shade and have been shown to reduce urban temperatures by 5%. Carole from Washingborough has been in touch – she is constantly grappling with plastic leaves which blow into her garden from a neighbour's fake foliage screen. Carole points out that 'fake plants quickly discolour and rot in the sun and the wind carries the leaf shapes in all directions so local soil is constantly filled with more and more'. She asks if there is a way to get these products banned. Perhaps we could lobby local garden centres to stop stocking them?

Well done, Tortilla restaurant in the Cornhill! They have replaced their fake plants with real ones.

We have seen lovely hanging baskets at the William Foster on Guildhall Street, too!



Guerrilla Gardening

Guerrilla Gardening is defined as the act of cultivating plants in a public place, usually in a spot not otherwise being cared for, often with the aim of improving the surroundings and protecting the environment. Climate activist, Ellen Miles, elaborates 'It's direct action against nature deprivation and depletion – highlighting the issue of biophobic urbanisation while fighting it. It's fighting for people, plants and the planet by taking action into your own hands'.

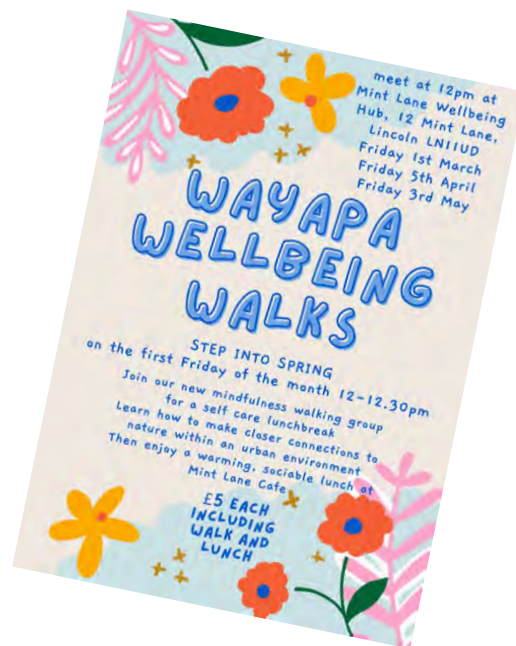


Charity Pot Event at Lush
