Support the campaign to save Lincolnshire Wolds National Landscape from oil drilling

SOS Biscathorpe is a group of local volunteers who are campaigning to prevent oil drilling going ahead in the Lincolnshire Wolds National Landscape (previous designation: Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty) which is home to a precious chalk stream; there are only 200 of these fragile ecosystems in the world.

Lincolnshire County Council's decision to refuse permission for oil drilling was overturned by the Planning Inspector in 2023. However, thanks to generous supporters, SOS Biscathorpe were able to raise enough funding to bring together a brilliant legal team to challenge the Inspector's decision at the High Court last summer, and won! So, the Inspector's decision was quashed.

Unfortunately, it's not over. The planning application will now be 're-determined' on Appeal by another Inspector. Previously, the climate impact of Scope 3 emissions (from burning the oil) was deemed inadmissible by the Planning system, but due to a recent Supreme Court ruling, these emissions must now be taken into account. As the test case for this approach, Biscathorpe could set an important planning precedent for future oil and gas development in the UK.

The International Energy Agency has stated that there can be no new fossil fuel development if the world is to stay within safe limits of global heating and meet the goal of net zero emissions by 2050.

Once again, we need to raise funds for legal & expert fees to fight the Appeal. Our lawyers continue to work for a fraction of their normal fees and every penny raised will go towards the ongoing costs of the campaign.

Please support our campaign to protect the Lincolnshire Wolds and ensure a healthy, liveable planet for future generations.

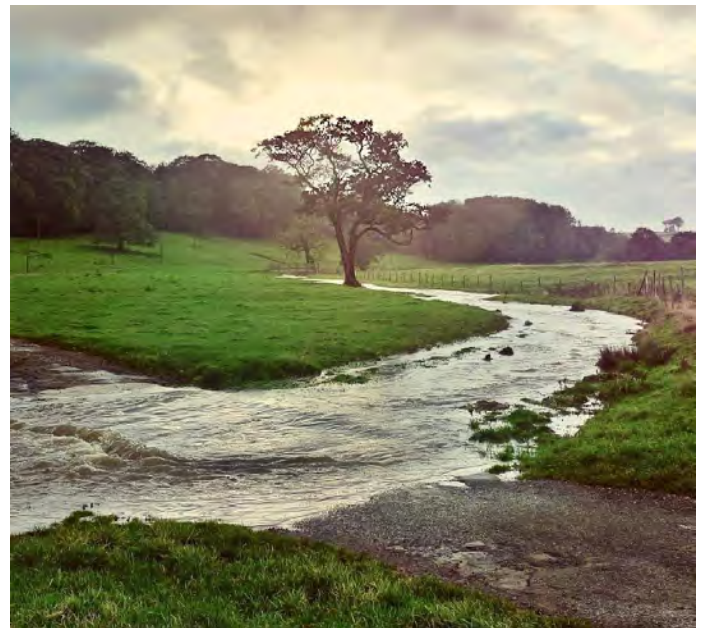
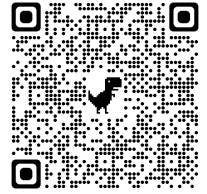

Pesticides

There is growing concern in the UK, and internationally, about the use of pesticides to control 'weeds' in public and private spaces, particularly in urban areas.

The herbicide most widely used is glyphosate, sold as *Roundup*. There is some debate about just how toxic it is, and how specifically it can be applied; the evidence is very strong, however, that it affects not just the target plants, but also surrounding plants, soil organisms and aquatic life as a result of runoff. It also has serious implications for human health.

There are of course many non-toxic methods of control, including manual removal, strimming, burning, etc., but many cash-strapped councils reject these as being too labour intensive, i.e. expensive. The simplest and cheapest solution, of course, is to leave them alone: stop calling them weeds and accept them for what they are – wild flowers.

There are many groups campaigning to urge councils to ban the use of glyphosate and other chemical controls, notably PAN (*Pesticide Action Network*)

and *Pesticide Collaboration*. To date, over fifty councils have either imposed bans on herbicides or have committed to phase them out within a few years. *Garden Organic* are urging the government to also ban the use of herbicide in urban areas.

France is well ahead of the curve: pesticides have been banned since 2017 in all towns and cities, and since 2019 in private gardens.

I have been in communication with City of Lincoln Council, urging them to ban the use of herbicides in parks and allotments and on roadside verges, but have come up against the cost argument.

I would urge EarthLincs supporters to consult one of the above campaign groups, and ask their local councils to consider banning, or at least phasing out, the use of herbicides.

What Can I Do in 2025?

As we look forward to 2025 it is difficult not to feel frustrated, angry and scared as we are still well off track in creating a sustainable future for our Planet. CO2 levels continue to rise and global temperatures set a new record in 2024 passing the 1.5C level for the first time. The recent flooding in the UK and wildfires in the USA illustrate the devastating effects our changing climate is having on our Planet and the Election of Donald Trump as President of the USA, a climate change denier, with his call to 'Drill Baby Drill', is not good news.

However there is reason for hope, "The world now invests almost twice as much in clean energy as it does in fossil fuel, almost everywhere, solar and wind are now the cheapest sources of new electricity - and the fastest growing in history," (UN Sec General). Across the globe communities are coming together to act on climate. During 2024 in South Korea young people successfully sued the government for weak climate policies and in Switzerland there was a similar victory this time for a group of older Swiss women. Communities are adapting and becoming more resilient to Climate Change, from developing drought resistant crops, restoring degraded land, installing early warning systems and planting trees. If you use the Ecosia search engine, <https://www.ecosia.org/>, you have helped plant 13 million trees across the globe in 2024. There are plenty more ideas for actions you can take at <https://takethejump.org/> including changes to what you eat, how you travel and how much you consume.

One of the most impactful actions you can take is through your finances. You can move your bank account to an ethical bank. If you have a private pension the chances are your money will be invested in fossil fuel companies. The is also the case for the government workplace pension scheme NEST, but in both cases you can move your money to fossil free funds which will continue to give you a good

return on your investments. The Local government pension scheme in Lincolnshire currently invests around £90 million in fossil fuels and only a few members have ever raised the issue of fossil fuel investment with the County Council who administer the fund!
